Nat Cool, Primata, Douro, Portugal, 1000ml

£6.00 (175ml), £8.50 (250ml), £30.00 (Bottle)

Nat Cool, naturally cool and funky, is an innovative concept created by Dirk Niepoort with the aim of bringing together various different producers to produce light, easy-drinking wines. Half of the grapes for the Primata Natcool are harvested from a Touriga Nacional vineyard while 50% come from old vines, with all fruit stemming from the Tabuaço region of the Cima Corgo. Whole bunches were lightly foot-trodden so as to extract some juice without damaging the grape skins. They were then left to spontaneously ferment and macerate in lagars (stone trough) before being pressed into stainless steel tanks where the wine completed malolactic fermentation, aged for 6 months and also naturally stabilised during the winter. **Served chilled!** Naturally cool!

806	Castelnau, Brut, Champagne, France, 375ml, NV Sometimes a bottle of Champagne is a bit too much, so here is the exact same wine as our House Champagne, served in elegant half bottles. Perfect to start the meal.	£24
100	Rouxvale, Chardonnay Brut, Robertson, South Africa, NV South Africa produces many sparkling wines based on their Methode Cap Classique. This phrase was first used in 1992, with the worldwide ban on the word Champagne. It describes the same technique and produces beautiful results of light, floral bubbly.	£35
101	Vitteau Alberti, Cremant de Bourgogne, Burgundy, France, NV Burgundy might not have the chalky notes you get in the prestigious region of Champagne, but the benefits of warmer weather can be found in the richness and body of this sparkler. Wonderful for food pairings, especially rustic French cuisine and awkward vegetable dishes.	£39
010	Champagne Castelnau, Brut Reserve, Champagne, France, NV Aged for 5 years on the creamy lees, the wine is smooth and fresh with notes of fresh apricots, yellow apples, and succulent pears.	£45
102	Vina Eden, Brut Nature, Maldonado, Uruguay, NV Uruguay is becoming a proper Mecca for sparkling wine, with the mountainous, oceanside vineyards producing wines of excellent quality. The brut nature is bone-dry with crisp minerality and delicate green pear notes.	£52
010	Champagne Castelnau, Rosé, Champagne, France, NV Beautiful Rosé aged and matured in the cellars of Castelnau. Beautifully floral and aromatic, with soft and creamy mousse.	£52
103	<b>Tickerage, Classic Cuvée Brut, East Sussex, England, 2013</b> Only 6000 bottles of this fantastic sparkling wine were ever made. We only have our hands on a handful, and they are glorious. It had plenty of time to mature and is showing delicate honeyed aromas and rich damson plums, but it still retains its freshness and elegance.	£65
104	Castelnau, Blanc de Blancs, Champagne, France, 2006 Blanc de Blancs is a style that has been favoured by drinkers for its floral notes that come with using only white grapes in Champagne making. Vintage brings out a bolder, riper style of wine.	£83

106	Pol Roger, Blanc de Blancs, Champagne, France, 2015  Pol Roger came to prominence when the late great Sir Winston Churchill declared it his favourite Champagne. In return, the Champagne House honoured him with naming their tete de cuvée Sir Winston Churchill. Sourced from Grand Cru villages only, this Blanc de Blancs is soft and creamy, with an incredibly fine mousse. You can find aromas of butter caramel, hazelnuts, and toasty brioche.	£114
107	<b>Laurent Perrier, Rose, Champagne, France, NV</b> Famously blended with 3 separate vintages. One to provide the fruit, one the freshness and the last one the delicacy, Laurent-Perrier is a titan of rosé Champagne.	£116
108	<b>Taittinger, Comtes de Champagne, Champagne, France, 2005</b> 2005 is one of the most wonderful vintages of the last 30 years, with rich, powerful expression and lovely toasted brioche notes. Taittinger really nailed it with this one.	£185
807	Castelnau, 1995, Champagne, France, 1500ml, 1995  A rare opportunity to try Champagne with a bit of age and aged correctly. Champagne should always age in magnums, as it retains bubbles better, but also lets in tiny amounts of air, to evolve the wine.	£233
109	Dom Perignon, Brut, Champagne, France, 2010  The famous monk Dom Perignon perfected the way we make white wine out of red grapes and the Domaine pays homage to that with each and every vintage. Beautiful wine.	£235
110	<b>Louis Roederer, Cristal, Champagne, France, 2012</b> Cristal is one of the most perfect expressions of Champagne. It was popularized by hip hop artists in the 90s, which didn't suit Roederer and led to an ongoing beef with Jay-Z who called for a boycott of the brand. Unfortunately, it didn't work, or this beauty could be available at much, much lower prices.	£285
111	Krug, Grand Cuvée, Champagne, France, NV  Arguably, one of the best Champagnes in the world. The attention to detail, the amount of dedication and hard work that goes into making a bottle of this wine is unrivalled. It is said, due to Krug's obsession of perfection, more grapes end up on the ground, than actually harvested and vinified	£295

201	Barbebelle, Rose, Provence, France, 2021  The bearded chap on the label speaks to the modernicity of this Provençal gem. Lychee, cranberry, and flowering strawberries, make this pink one of our favourite summer pours.	£29
202	Mirabeau, Pure Rose, Provence, France, 2021  The Pure is Mirabeau's best wine, with beautiful fresh berry and floral notes. It reminds us of a beautiful May afternoon and the smell you get from the blooming bushes in Spring.	£34
203	Panoramico, Clarete Rosé, Rioja, Spain, 2019 Unique rosé made traditionally by fermenting both white and red grapes together. This is incredibly quaffable and enjoyable. Goes beautifully with charcuterie and with pretty much any weather.	£40
204	Chateau d'Esclans, Whispering Angel, Provence, France, 2021  Everyone has heard of Whispering Angel. Owned by the prestigious LVMH conglomerate, the wine has been one of the most popular wines of the last decade, with stocks increasingly difficult to get.	£49
205	Fattoria Aldobrandesca, A, Rosé, Tuscany, Italy, 2020  Antinori make this beautiful rosé from an ancient grape variety called Aleatico still growing in the area since the Etruscan times. Incredibly elegant, with remarkable freshness brought to us by the black volcanic soils under the vineyards.	£61
206	Domaine Ott, Clos Mireille, Provence, France, 2019  Ott's fantastic single vineyard Clos Mireille has been consistently awarded medals for best wines (not just rosé), received some of the highest scores by wine judges and is a staple of any good wine list for a reason. Delicate with flavours of fragrant raspberries and strawberry cheesecake.	£72
207	Chateau d'Esclans, Garrus, Provence, France, 2020 Arguably one of the greatest wines ever produced. And yes, we mean wines, not just rosé. There is something Burgundian about this wine, the sublime elegance and complexity. This is the top wine of the Chateau that also created the fan favourite Whispering Angel.	£157

801   Barbebelle, Rose, Provence, France, 1500ml, 2018  This beautiful Magnum is perfect for a summer's afternoon, when all you really want to do is destroy a bottle of rosé. Wines in magnums taste better. That is a fact. Rose bush, rose hip and rose colour are all perfect in this cheerful Provence rosé.	£45
802   Louis Latour, Montagny, Burgundy, France, 1500ml, 2016  Latour's beautiful Montagny is served in a magnum here. The slow ageing in this large bottle is emphasizing the stewed apples, soft cinnamon and vanilla and apple strudel notes.	£75
803   Moulin-a-Vent, Beaujolais, France, 1500ml, 2012  Cheerful Beaujolais from the most floral Cru, Moulin-a-Vent - the Windmill. Age adds complexity to these wines, with dried rose petals starting to come to life, the cherries are turning towards flowering cherry trees and the strawberries are gaining ripeness.	£75
804   Chateau Cantin, St.Emilion, Bordeaux, France, 1500ml, 2018  Lovely Bordeaux from the right bank. Based on Merlot with a heavy proportion of Cabernet Franc, the wine is perfect with sharing meat platters or even cheese. Why not have a steak board for the table and a nice magnum of red.	£87
808   Chateau de Miniere, Old vine Cabernet Franc, Loire, France, 1500ml, 2009  These 100-year-old vines have produced an immense Cab Franc. An absolute stunner of a wine with luscious aromas of blackberries, delicious blueberries, and a green vivacious aroma characteristic of the Cabernet grapes.	£129
810   Chateau Haut-Bages-Libéral, Pauillac, Bordeaux, France, 2000 Situated next to Chateau Latour, this 5 <sup>th</sup> Grand Cru Classée is an impressive out of the box thinking sort of wine. Claire Villars-Lurton runs the cellar and plays with some crazy looking amphorae made from Limoges porcelain. Her creativity has made this estate a force to be reckoned with and the 2000 was her first vintage, so enjoy this little piece of history!	£284

### 301 | Inacayal, Torrontes, Mendoza, 2019

Torrontes is a fantastic grape variety mainly grown in Argentina. One of its' parents is the aromatic Muscat de Alexandria, and it shows. The wine is full of aromatic stone fruit and refreshing acidity.

### Australia

### 302 | Peter Lehmann, Riesling, Eden Valley, 2015

£46

Bone-dry Riesling is one of the most quaffable wines on the planet, and no-one does it better than the surfers in South Australia. Eden Valley is much colder than most of Australia delivering these crisp delicious wines.

### Austria

### 303 | Stephan Pratsch, Gruner Veltliner Reserve, Weinviertel, 2018

£49

Gruner is the main white grape in the underrated Austrian vineyards. Fresh, but bold, with spicy white pepper and floral notes. This Reserve is highly concentrated, with a great mineral expression.

### Greece

### 322 | Vassaltis, Assyrtiko, Santorini, 2018

£55

The wine that gives you the ability to teleport. When tasting this succulent, tropical and citrusy wine, we can almost taste the fresh salty air on the beautiful island of Santorini. Assyrtiko is the native grape variety. They often train the vines into a little protective bush to protect them from the harsh winds blowing in the hills, which means they are always hand-picked. And it shows.

### Hungary

### 323 | Kikelet, Kassai Harslevelu, Tokaji, 2018

This unpronounceable grape variety has been overshadowed by its slightly easier to say brother Furmint. We were incredibly lucky to get acquainted with this beautiful single vineyard wine, which put Harslevelu back on the map for us and every time we get to open one, we get a blissful smile.

### Germany £39 320 | Dr. Loosen, Bernkasteler Lay, Riesling Kabinett, Mosel, 2019 Riesling is a fantastic grape variety, incredibly versatile. This Kabinett example is slightly offdry, perfect with spicier dishes, and those requiring refreshing acidity and tons of delectable fruit notes. £79 321 Dr. Loosen, Wehlener Sohnennur, G.G. Riesling, Mosel, 2018 Grosses Gewachs is the German equivalent to Grand Cru. Only the best vineyards get this classification, and they must be vinified dry. The result is immensely complex dry Riesling with incredible aromatic character and supreme mineral backbone. Slovenia £36 353 | Urban Petric, Pinela, Goriska Brda, 2019 The super rare Pinela grape variety is planted in less than 50ha of vineyards in the World. After originally growing mainly in Italy, it has been adopted as a Slovenian grape variety. The wine itself is fresh and light, but full of flavour. Floral, with gentle citrus notes. 338 | Gasper, Rebula, Goriska Brda, 2018 £45 Outstanding Rebula or more famously called Ribolla Gialla, from the rolling hills of Brda. Succulent, mineral, with round ripe stone fruit aromas and delicate citrus. Perfect with Charcuterie. **Portugal** 335 | Portal de Calcada, Reserva, Vinho Verde, 2020 £26 These young wines offer fantastic spritzy freshness and crisp green apple, pear, and lime aromas. Main wine of choice, when choosing partners for oysters, crab salad or to sip on its own. £35 336 | Howards Folly, Sonadhor, Alentejo, 2018 Incredible wine from Portugal's first urban winery. The state-of-the-art facility was created inside a heritage building in the town of Estremoz. Fantastic field blend of unique grape varieties and unique flavours. £54 337 | Vulcao, Ameixabar, Azores Islands, 2019

In the middle of the Atlantic, there lie the Azores Islands. Their long history of winemaking is completely forgotten and brushed off. But times are changing. We are very excited to showcase this 8<sup>th</sup> wonder of the World, this blend of Arinto and Terrantez de Pico. Bone dry, supremely

complex with a rich palate and a finish that lasts forever.

### South Africa £43 339 | Remhoogte, Honeybunch Chenin Blanc, Stellenbosch, 2019 A bunch of honey is exactly what this wine smells like, with notes of acacia, lemon candy and silk. The skins were left in the wine for just a bit, to add depth and character to this beautiful Chenin. £49 340 | Creation, Chardonnay, Hermanus, 2019 From the Hemel-en-Aarde, the Heaven and Earth mountains. The high altitude and cool ocean air, allow Chardonnay to develop an elegant, restrained style, helped of course by the Frenchtrained, Swiss winemaker Jean-Claude "JC" Martyn. 355 | Ken Forrester, The FMC, Stellenbosch, 2018 £58 The f\*\*\*\*\* magnificent Chenin as it is 'affectionately' called, this is Ken Foresters masterpiece. The wine that shot him into world fame, the wine is silky smooth, with decadent apple and pear notes, a touch of lemon drop, and surprising richness. New Zealand 332 | Dog Point, Sauvignon Blanc, Marlborough, 2020 £32 Dog point is a classic Kiwi Sauvignon with notes of elderflower, gooseberry, and soft freshly mowed grass. This epitomizes what Kiwis are all about. £36 333 | Mt.Difficulty, Riesling, Central Otago, 2017 Mt. Difficulty, named after a mountain in Central Otago, has been an impressive player with their Burgundian grape varieties, but for the past few years they have been producing wonderful aromatic wines with Pinot Gris and of course this wonderful Riesling. Apricots and tangerines lace this lovely crisp wine with just a touch of sweetness, to balance it all out. £41 334 | Wairau River, Reserve Sauvignon Blanc, Marlborough, 2019 A more complex, food-friendly Kiwi SB, made from stand-out plots in the vineyard. The wine was fermented in oak barrels to give it breadth and longevity. A bit fruitier, rather than grassy. £55 352 | Cloudy Bay, Sauvignon Blanc, Marlborough, 2022

Cloudy Bay is an iconic winery in New Zealand. David Hohnen, an Ozzie, first pioneered winemaking in Western Australia with Cape Mentelle, and after seeing potential in Marlborough, started Cloudy Bay in 1985, and a revolution that made New Zealand – The

341	Pandora, Pandra Verdejo, Rueda, 2020  Verdejo should have a much better reputation that it currently has. We've found this Ruedan beauty to help it in that manner. Straw colour with zesty citrus flavours and white grapefruit.	£27
342	Domingo Martin, Albarino, Rias Baixas, 2019  A classic Rias Baixas Albarino with grapefruit flower, white peach, and sweet green pears. Classic pairings with Paella and other Atlantic dishes.	£30
357	Adegas Terrae Agoreira, Godello, Valdeoras Godello, a grape variety in full revival mode, has been rediscovered as a high-quality grape variety, after decades of mismanagement. It is great for us, as the prices are still low, so now is a great time to jump aboard the Godello train, this wonderfully mineral wine, with aromas of quince and grapefruit.	£35
343	<b>Granbazan, Etiquets Ambar, Albarino, Rias Baixas, 2020</b> An outrageous value for money with this Albarino. Hand-picked, with very slow fermentation on the soft creamy lees, give this wine extra character. Not just a simple wine, this has some serious texture and profound, aromatic profile.	£41
356	Raul Perez, sketch, Albarino, Rias Baixas, 2020  One of Worlds' rarest wines, this epitome of Albarino is produced in less than two barrels. Incredible length and complexity make this wine compete against the greatest white wines in the World. Raul named the wine in honour of his favourite London restaurant, the famed 3 Michelin starred "sketch".	£127

344	The Federalist, Chardonnay, California, 2017  The Federalist project is a tribute to Alexander Hamilton, one of USAs most important politicians, so it had to be done well. Most of the fruit comes from the cooler Mendocino, making this a more restrained American Chardy.	£40
345	Au Bon Climat, Wild Boy Chardonnay, Santa Barbara, 2018	£47

We lost the legendary Jim Clendenen recently, but the legacy of his wines carries on. Arguably one of his greatest creations, the ultra-delicious Wild Boy Chardonnay is everything you want from an American Chardy and more. Soft, round, and opulent, with loads of sweet spice, vanilla,

346	HJ Wiemer, Dry Riesling Reserve, Finger Lakes, NY, 2019  The Finger Lakes are incredibly cold and are famed for their production of sweet Rieslings and ice wine. This is something very different, with no residual sugar, the wine is bolder, but retains Riesling's signature freshness and aromatic character.	£48
347	Big Table Farm, Wild Bee Chardonnay, Oregon, 2019  This homestead in Oregon is home to many animals and they each give their name to the best wines they produce. The Wild Bees pollinating these Chardonnay vines, also touch some of the local flowers and you can feel the presence of camomile, acacia trees and even a touch of pine sap, that feels beautifully refreshing. The wine is bold and characteristic for Oregon.	£52
354	Channing Daughters, Ribolla Gialla, Long Island, NY, 2015  Not quite an 'orange' wine, but very close to it. The wine has been macerated with the skins for about three weeks, to add texture and richness. A period of oak ageing adds even more breadth to this interesting wine from the cool Long Island.	£57
348	Spell Estate, Sonoma Chardonnay, California, 2019 Russian River Valley is the coolest Chardonnay growing area in California, so the wines from this area tend to be the most polished and delicate. But they still hold true to the American style, with plenty of power and muscle. This can easily take on a steak or some nicely prepared barbecue meat.	£62
	Italy	
324	Roberto Sarotto, Gavi di Gavi, Piedmont, 2020 'A piedi di monte' - at the foot of the mountains lies one of Italy's finest wine regions. Piedmont makes fantastic, reds, whites, fizzes, and sweets. Gavi is a village in the southern part where they make wonderful floral wines from the local Cortese grape variety.	£28
325	Molmenti & Celot, Friulano, Friuli, 2020 Friulano used to be called Tocai, then Tocai Friulano, until they finally landed on Friulano to avoid any confusion with the Hungarian wine region. This dry wine is grown in the Collio on the border with Slovenia and it is a rare example of the Slovenian style imposing itself on the Italians. Almonds, honey, and blossoming flowers are particular highlights in a wine like this.	£28
326	<b>Villa Raiano, Fiano di Avellino, Campania, 2020</b> It is more common to find great white wines in the North of Italy, but Fiano proves it can be done in the South as well. Gently crushed grapes to avoid bruising, the wine is soft, round and extremely quaffable. Often called the greatest white grape variety in Italy.	£32

328	Le Strette, Nas-cetta, Piedmont, 2020 Similar to the Arneis, local white grape varieties around Alba nearly disappeared in the 1950s. We have only a few passionate winemakers to thank for the resurgence of these grape varieties. Acacia, grapefruit, and honey make these wines stand out as there aren't any other wines that come close to it.	£37
329	Roberto Sarotto, Arneis, Piedmont, 2020  A lost grape variety that found a second wind after the Vietti and Giacosa families kept it alive. Planted on sandy Roero soils, it is one of the most unique tasting white wines we've tried.	£41
330	Cantina Sorres, Su Bicu Vermentino, Sardinia, 2019  Laura and Delia, the 2 sisters (Sorres) in charge of this tiny project are as Sardinian as it gets.  Loud and direct. The wine matches that philosophy, with this Vermentino showing a very clean palate, with aromatic white pears, juicy yellow apples, and a touch of salinity.	£42

There is a touch of Cabernet Sauvignon added to the blend at the very end, to bring out more bass and a sturdy backbone.

### Georgia

### 654 | Tbilvino, Saperavi, Kakheti, 2020

Along with Armenia, Georgia has one of the longest winemaking histories of anyone. A lot of their winemaking is still very traditional, with the use of clay amphorae – kvevri. This Saperavi is a more modern iteration, with fruit forward character and a much smoother finish, mainly due to subtle oak ageing this wine goes under. Incredible value for money, considering this was all hand-crafted.

### Germany

### 655 | Kopp, Spatburgunder, Baden, 2016

Spatburgunder is the German word for Pinot Noir and there is more and more planted in German wine regions. Baden makes the most of it and the Pinots from the area gain a beautiful mineral aroma, sometimes reminiscent of graphite. Still packed full of delicate flowers and autumnal fruit, this is a bargain for what we pay for Pinot Noir these days.

#### Greece

### 575 | Thymiopoulos, Xinomavro, Naoussa, 2019

Xinomavro is one of the main Greek varieties and is responsible for some of its most impressive wines. The name comes from the words for "sour" and "black", which is how the berries taste at time of harvest. Once bottled, wines from Naoussa can often be likened to those of Nebbiolo in the villages of Barolo and Barbaresco in Italy. It is bold and structured with superb acidity and freshness and goes great with flavourful meats.

#### Slovenia

### 606 | Gasper, Cabernet Franc, Goriska Brda, 2018

The best wine produced by Gasper, consistently winning award after award for this beautiful Cabernet Franc. Vivacious and lively, it sits somewhere between a green Loire Valley Cabernet and something riper, like an Argentinian Cabernet Franc. Beautiful wine with pork, lamb and even steak.

### Uruguay

### 626 | Vina Eden, Tannat Cemento, Maldonado, 2017

Tannat has often been dubbed one of the healthiest grape varieties, due to its high tannin content. The wines are rich and inky, with powerful fruit aromas. The Cemento has been fermented in concrete eggs instead of oak, which allow the wine to showcase itself, not flavours of oak. 605   Casa Ferreirinha, Quinta do Leda, Douro, 2017  Casa Ferreirinha is a legend in the Douro. The first winery to completely focus on dry still wines rather than Port, they revolutionised premium still wines of the Douro. The superbly intense Quinta do Leda is based on the border with Spain in Douro Superior region and it is a beautiful blend of Touriga Nacional, Tinta Cao, Tinta Roriz and of course Touriga Franca.

Pavie Macquin has been fully organic and then biodynamic since the 90s and this helped reinvigorate the estate. In the late 80s the wines felt tired, as if the soil had nothing to give, but once they started looking after it the estate has been going full steam ahead. The last 15 years or so the wines have been easily competing with the very best Chateaux in St. Emilion and Pomerol.

## 556 | Chateau Pavie Macquin, St. Emilion, 1996

£197

The first biodynamic vintage of Pavie Macquin after slowly converting in the years before. Ploughed vines, home-made compost, increased biodiversity, and many other tiny improvements have reinvigorated the estate to give it new life. This was the first truly great wine of the Chateau.

## 556 | Chateau Lafleur, Pensées de Lafleur, Pomerol, 1996

£307

The tiny Chateau Lafleur produces some of Pomerol's greatest and most unique wines, with an even distribution of Merlot and Cabernet Franc, which is rare for the area. The small size of the vineyards allows for extreme selection and meticulous approach both in the vineyard and cellar, with only 500 cases of this wine produced annually. It is in its perfect drinking window, with perfumed fruit and vivacious body curtesy of Cabernet Franc.

## Left bank Bordeaux, France

## 521 | Chateau Le Monge, Médoc, 2017

£29

Médoc is situated on the Left Bank of Bordeaux and the wine stays true to the classic blending patterns of the area. The gravelly soils benefit Cabernet Sauvignon the most, with Cabernet Franc supplementing most of the remaining blend to add a bit of freshness to the wine. Great value wine.

## 522 | Chateau Lamothe, Haut-Medoc, 2017

£39

Made in the town of Cissac in the Northern part of Bordeaux left bank, the wine is surprisingly heavy in Merlot, making this wine approachable at a very young age. No need to wait years and years to enjoy it, but it works especially well with saltier savoury dishes that really bring those dark plum notes out to play.

523   Chateau Patache d'Aux, Médoc, 2009  The legendary 2009 vintage produced some of the most incredible wines in Bordeaux ever. Apart from a bit of hail at the end of April, the year had perfect growing conditions for wines to develop aromatic profile, structure, acidity and still remain reasonable in terms of alcohol level. Patache d'Aux is always good value for money, but here it lets us taste the incredible 2009 at what seems like a ridiculous offer.	£60
524   Les Fiefs de Lagrange, St.Julien, 2013 Wines from St. Julien tend to show a lot of power and this one is no different. Blackberry notes, cassis and strong menthol freshness stand up to that power beautifully. As it ages, dark chocolate and roasted coffee is starting to show and the berries are starting to dry out, more plum character is evident.	£62
525   Chateau Pedesclaux, Pauillac, 2016  Fantastic organic Pauillac, with immense power on the nose and on the palate. The tannins are firm and savoury, with a tonne of juicy blueberries, wild strawberry jam, and creme de cassis.	£70
527   Chateau Gloria, St.Julien, 2017  We love Chateau Gloria, because of its approachability. It is remarkably affordable for what it offers, and it is always ready to drink, the moment it leaves the estate. Yes, time would improve it, but it's rare to get the feeling of completeness in a wine so early. Gloria delivers that, in every vintage.	£91
528   La Croix Ducru-Beaucalieu, St.Julien, 2010 Why people overlook St. Julien is beyond us. Of all the Left bank communes, this is by far the greatest value for money village with wines famous for their deep, powerful character. Strong black fruits are classic for the region and in 2010 the fruit is there on display for all to see.	£94
529   Chateau Gloria, St.Julien, 2014 Gloria with a few extra years under her belt, 2014 can often be an overlooked vintage, because many say it does not have the ageing potential of 2010 or even 09. Who cares? We want to drink it now anyway!	£94
531   Chateau Pedesclaux, Pauillac, 2010  Basically, if we find a 2010 Bordeaux, we list it. It is so rare to see them pop up on the market and the quality of that year truly was remarkable. We are fans of Chateau Pedesclaux, due to their fruit-forward approach and organic farming, even more so in great years like this one.	£103

## 530 | Chateau Desmirail, Margaux, 2010

£115

A unique 3rd growth, with history spanning to the start of the 17th century. Unique, because unlike most of the classified growths, Desmirail chooses to use equal proportions of Cabernet and Merlot, which they can achieve thanks to a clay plateau, perfect from growing high quality Merlot grapes. Wonderful texture of the wine with aromas of dried fruit and herbs, sweet prunes and cassis.

## 532 | Chateau Prieure Lichine, Margaux, 2016

£123

This 4eme Grand Cru Classée is a bit of a jewel of the Cantenac appellation within Margaux. Born out of two estates Ch Le Prieure and Ch Prieure-Cantenac, it had lost its way for a while, but has been coming back in a big way. Luckily for us, the price hasn't caught up to its full potential yet. The wine is beautiful, red fruits dominate the aromas, with candied red apples, sweet cherries and creme de framboise.

## 533 | Chateau d'Issan, Margaux, 2009

£135

A 3eme Grand Cru Classée, Chateau d'Issan is one of those rare Chateaux that was placed in the right category in the 1855 Grand Cru Classification and remained consistent for over 200 years. Some wineries were put into a higher category than they deserved, some into a lower, but Issan, seems to be perfect, where it is. It is very classic Margaux, with red fruit dominating and this is particularly evident in such a strong vintage as 2009 was.

## 534 | Clos du Marquis, St.Julien, 2012

£149

Made by Chateau Leoville-Les Cases, the idea behind Clos de Maquis was to showcase the subtle difference between the terroir of Les Cases and what Clos de Marquis vineyards are planted on. The unique difference is that Clos de Maquis vineyards used to be a forest, meaning the organic matter in the soil has fed it nutrients which created a completely different wine.

## 535 | Chateau Leoville-Barton, St.Julien, 2012

£155

Chateau Leoville-Barton is not a Chateau at all. The wine is produced at Chateau Langoa-Barton, but the vineyards are still planted where the ancient Chateaux was situated. The Barton family has owned the estates for over 200 years and have been making remarkable wines from this 2eme Grand Cru Classée.

## 658 | Chateau Durfort-Vivens, Margaux, 2017

£162

A consistent underperformer among the  $2^{nd}$  growths, Durfort-Vivens is coming back in a strong way thanks to the leadership of Gonzague Lurton. The famous Lurtons have owned the estate since 1961, They use the most Cabernet Sauvignon of anyone in South Médoc sometimes reaching 85%.

## 536 | Chateau Branaire-Ducru, St.Julien, 2009

£171

We've always found Branaire-Ducru to be overperforming its' 4eme Grand Cru Classée status. It delivers so much more, and it has a unique character making it very easy to spot in a line-up of St. Juliens. Uniqueness is what makes good wines truly great.

## 537 | Chateau Lascombes, Margaux, 2005

£182

2005 was fantastic for Pauillac everyone says. The already powerful wines had even more power. Somehow Margaux did not get the same plaudits. When we were privileged to try an '05 Lascombes we were baffled as to why.

## 538 | Chateau Brane Cantenac, Margaux, 2010

£195

Owned by the famous Bordeaux family Lurton, this 2eme Grand Cru Classée is one of those wines that was wavering a bit in the 70s and 80s. It underperformed, but since Henri Lurton took over the reins in the 90s, the quality is back where it belongs and that is even more evident in the glorious 2010 vintage.

## 539 | Chateau Pichon Baron, Pauillac, 2012

£207

2012 is the most disrespected vintage of the last 20 years. It's not its fault to be fair. It was surrounded by the amazing '09, '10 and '11 and expectations were high. It did fall short, but it is still a good year. Instead of ageing the wines for 40+ years, this will be at its peak from '22 to '26. And for Chateaux like the great Pichon Baron, they don't know how to make a bad wine anyway.

## 540 | Chateau Montrose, St. Estephe, 2008

£233

Montrose is made for age. Another 2eme Grand Cru Classée that is single-handedly carrying their commune on its back. The epitome of St. Estephe, Chateau Montrose wines are macerated for a long period of time to ensure depth of colour, super-extraction of tannins and seriousness. Wines can easily deal with 50 years, but we like 2008 as an early-drinking vintage.

## 541 | Chateau Cos d'Estournel, St. Estephe, 2005

£245

Cos d'Estournel may be in St. Estephe, but it does not act like one. A unique style of the wine with a super high percentage of Merlot and bordering the Pauillac region is not what you would expect from a St. Estephe. Regardless, this is one of the most iconic wines in all of Bordeaux and in great vintages like the '05 it is one of the rare that can be uttered in the same breath as the ler Grand Cru Classées.

## 542 | Chateau Lynch-Bages, Pauillac, 2008

£275

By far the most expensive 5eme Grand Cru Classée, Lynch-Bages have a Benjamin button-like quality of almost ageing backwards. They are soft and approachable when young but become stronger and more powerful as they age. The '08 is already showing signs of tobacco leaf, the 'capa' of the cigar and a woody note.

## 543 | Chateau Lynch-Bages, Pauillac, 2009

£285

Very different to 2008, much more youthful and vibrant. The primary flavours are greatly overpowering any signs of tiredness or age. Yes, you can wait for this one for another 10 years, but do you really want to miss out on all the fruit?

## 544 | Chateau Palmer, Margaux, 2005

£419

Chateau Palmer makes spectacular wines that are rated as high as some of the 1ere Grand Cru Classées. Always rubbing elbows with biodynamic farming, because they believed the land will only give you what you give to it, they have converted to 100% biodynamic in the late '00s. The '05 was almost there, but not certified just yet. You can feel this approach brings out more life in the wines, more vivacity, and more complexity. It's remarkable.
